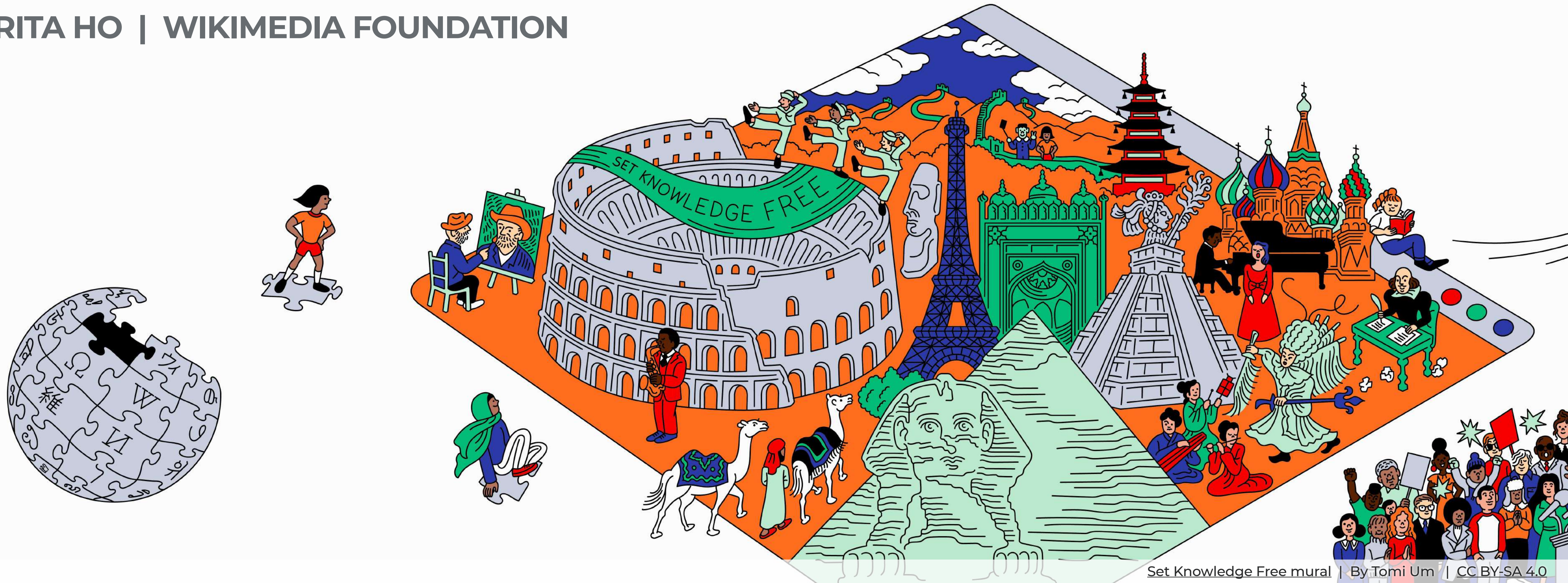

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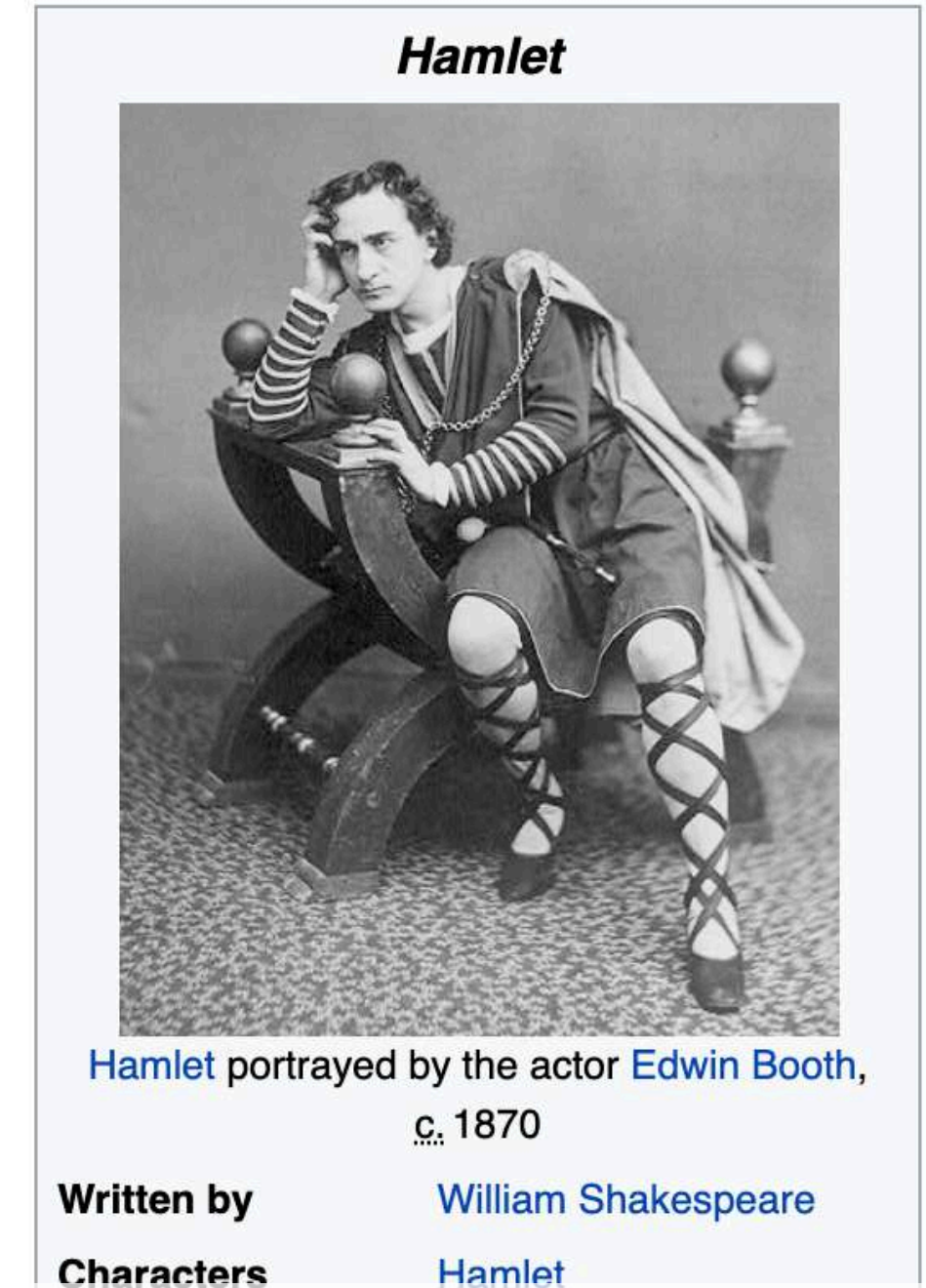

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Hamlet is considered among the most powerful and influential works of world literature, with a story capable of "seemingly endless retelling and adaptation by others".^[1] It was one of Shakespeare's most popular works during his lifetime^[2] and still ranks among his most performed, topping the performance list of the **Royal Shakespeare Company** and its predecessors in **Stratford-upon-Avon** since 1879.^[3] It has inspired many other writers—from **Johann Wolfgang von Goethe** and **Charles Dickens** to **James Joyce** and **Iris Murdoch**—and has been described as "the world's most filmed story after *Cinderella*".^[4]

The story of Shakespeare's *Hamlet* was derived from the legend of **Amleth**, preserved by 13th-century chronicler **Saxo Grammaticus** in his *Gesta Danorum*, as subsequently retold by the 16th-century scholar **François de Belleforest**. Shakespeare may also have drawn on an earlier **Elizabethan** play known today as the *Ur-Hamlet*, though some scholars believe Shakespeare wrote the *Ur-Hamlet*, later revising it to create the version of *Hamlet* that exists today. He almost certainly wrote his version of the title role for his fellow actor, **Richard Burbage**, the leading tragedian of Shakespeare's time. In the 400 years since its inception, the role has been performed by numerous highly acclaimed actors in each successive century.

Three different early versions of the play are extant: the **First Quarto** (Q1, 1603); the Second **Quarto** (Q2, 1604); and the **First Folio** (F1, 1623). Each version includes lines and entire scenes missing from the others. The play's structure and depth of characterisation have inspired much critical scrutiny. One such example is the centuries-old debate about Hamlet's hesitation to kill his uncle, which some see as merely a plot device to prolong the action but which others argue is a dramatisation of the complex philosophical and ethical issues that surround cold-blooded murder, calculated revenge, and thwarted desire. More recently, **psychoanalytic critics** have examined Hamlet's unconscious desires, while **feminist critics** have re-evaluated and attempted to rehabilitate the often-maligned characters of **Ophelia** and **Gertrude**.

Motivations for Editing Wikipedia

Finding 1. People edit Wikipedia for diverse reasons, most of which serve purposes beyond editing Wikipedia.

Similar to how people choose to spend their discretionary time, new editors edit Wikipedia because it can serve a variety of motivations. This research identified six main motivations for why new editors start editing Wikipedia. From these patterns of motivation, personas were developed. Personas are archetypes created from observed patterns of motivation and behavior, and do not represent specific individual people.



Audience Builder
Gong-Yoo

Audience Builders edit in order to leverage Wikipedia's reach for promoting their work or themselves.



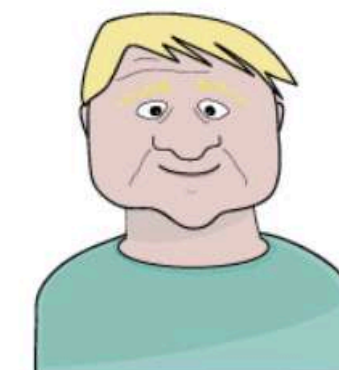
Box Checker
Mina

Box Checkers edit Wikipedia to satisfy an external reward or objective, such as completing a school assignment or as part of a job requirement.



Joiner-Inner
Helena

Joiner-Inners start to edit Wikipedia for the experience, usually to learn something new, be part of the offline community of editors, and/or meet new people.



Reactive Corrector
Josef

Reactive Correctors fix obvious errors or gaps they find on Wikipedia, and find these fixes easy and satisfying, but do not relate them to a larger vision.



Knowledge Sharer
Yankov

Knowledge Sharers have a desire to share their topical knowledge with others and participate in Wikipedia's mission.



Social Changer
Jae-Hee

Social Changers have a strong passion for an often topical or controversial issue and edit Wikipedia to influence how society views the issues they care about.

The Tragedy of Hamlet, Prince of Denmark, or more simply **Hamlet**, is a **tragedy** by **William Shakespeare**, believed to have been written between 1599 and 1601. The play vividly charts the course of real and feigned madness—from overwhelming grief to seething rage—and explores themes of treachery, revenge, incest, and moral corruption.


Despite much research, the exact year Hamlet was written remains in dispute. Three different early versions of the play have survived: these are known as the **First Quarto** (Q1), the Second **Quarto** (Q2) and the **First Folio** (F1). Each has lines, and even scenes, that are missing from the others. Shakespeare based *Hamlet* on the legend of **Amleth**, preserved by 13th-century chronicler **Saxo Grammaticus** in his **Gesta Danorum** as subsequently retold by 16th-century scholar **François de Belleforest**. He may have also drawn on, or perhaps written, an earlier (hypothetical) **Elizabethan** play known today as the *Ur-Hamlet*.

The play's structure and depth of characterization have inspired much critical scrutiny, of which one example is the centuries-old debate about Hamlet's hesitancy to kill his uncle. Some see it as a **plot device** to prolong the action, and others see it as the result of pressure exerted by the complex philosophical and ethical issues that surround cold-blooded murder, calculated revenge and thwarted desire. More recently, **psychoanalytic critics** have examined Hamlet's **unconscious desires**, and **feminist critics** have re-evaluated and rehabilitated the often maligned characters of **Ophelia** and **Gertrude**.


Hamlet is Shakespeare's longest play and among the most powerful and influential tragedies in the **English language**. It provides a storyline capable of "seemingly endless retelling and adaptation by others".^[1] During Shakespeare's lifetime, the play was one of his most popular works,^[2] and it still ranks high among his most-performed, topping, for example, the **Royal Shakespeare Company's** list since 1879.^[3] It has inspired writers from **Goethe** and **Dickens** to **Joyce** and **Murdoch** and has been described as "the world's most filmed story after *Cinderella*".^[4] The title role was almost certainly created for **Richard Burbage**, the leading tragedian of Shakespeare's time.^[5] In the four hundred years since, it has been performed by highly acclaimed actors and actresses from each successive age.

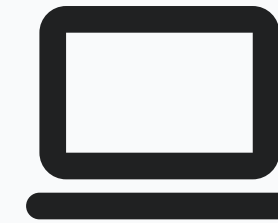

1. The desktop interface does not match the expectations created by the modern platforms. It feels disorienting and disconnected. Navigation and interface links are organized haphazardly.

It was published sometime between 1829 and 1833^[1] in the late Edo period as the first print in Hokusai's series *Thirty-six Views of Mount Fuji*. It is Hokusai's most famous work and is often considered the most recognizable work of Japanese art in the world.

The image depicts an enormous wave threatening three boats of the East Kanagawa Bay (Kanagawa Prefecture) while Mount Fuji rises in the background. Sometimes assumed to be a tsunami, the wave is more likely to be a large rogue wave.^[2] With the other prints in the series it depicts a area and activities around Mount Fuji under varying conditions. Throughout the series are dramatic uses of color and perspective.

Japan (Japanese: 日本, *Nippon* [nippo ˠɴ] listen) or *Nihon* [niho ˠɴ] listen); officially 日本国, *Nippon-koku* or *Nihon-koku*) is an island country located in East Asia. It is bordered by the Sea of Japan to the west and the Pacific Ocean to the east, and spans from the Sea of Okhotsk in the north to the East China Sea and Philippine Sea in the south. Part of the Pacific Ring of Fire, Japan encompasses an archipelago of about 6,852 islands, with five main islands (Hokkaido, Honshu, Kyushu, Shikoku, and Okinawa) comprising 97% of the country's area.

Japan is divided into 47 prefectures and traditionally into eight regions. Approximately two-thirds of the country's terrain is mountainous and heavily forested, and less than one-eighth of its land is suitable for agriculture. Consequently, Japan is among the most densely populated and urbanized countries in the world. The largest urban area is the metropolitan area centered on the capital city of Tokyo, which is the most populous in the world . Japan itself is the world's eleventh most populous country.

The kanji that make up the name of Japan mean "sun origin"; in the Western world, the country is often known by the sobriquet "Land of the Rising Sun". While archaeological evidence indicates that Japan was inhabited as early as the Upper Paleolithic period, the first written mention of the archipelago appears in Chinese texts from the first century AD. Between the fourth and ninth centuries, the kingdoms of Japan gradually unified under an Emperor and imperial court based in Heian-kyō (modern Kyoto). However, beginning in the twelfth century, *de facto* political power came to be held by a succession of military dictators (*shōgun*) and feudal lords (*daimyō*) and enforced by a class of warrior nobility known as samurai. After a century-long period of civil war, Japan was reunified in 1603 under the rule of the Tokugawa shogunate, which enacted a policy of isolationism. This period ended in 1853 when a United States fleet forced Japan to open to the West, leading to the fall of the shogunate and the restoration of imperial power in 1868. In the following Meiji era, Japan adopted a Western-style government and pursued a program of industrialization

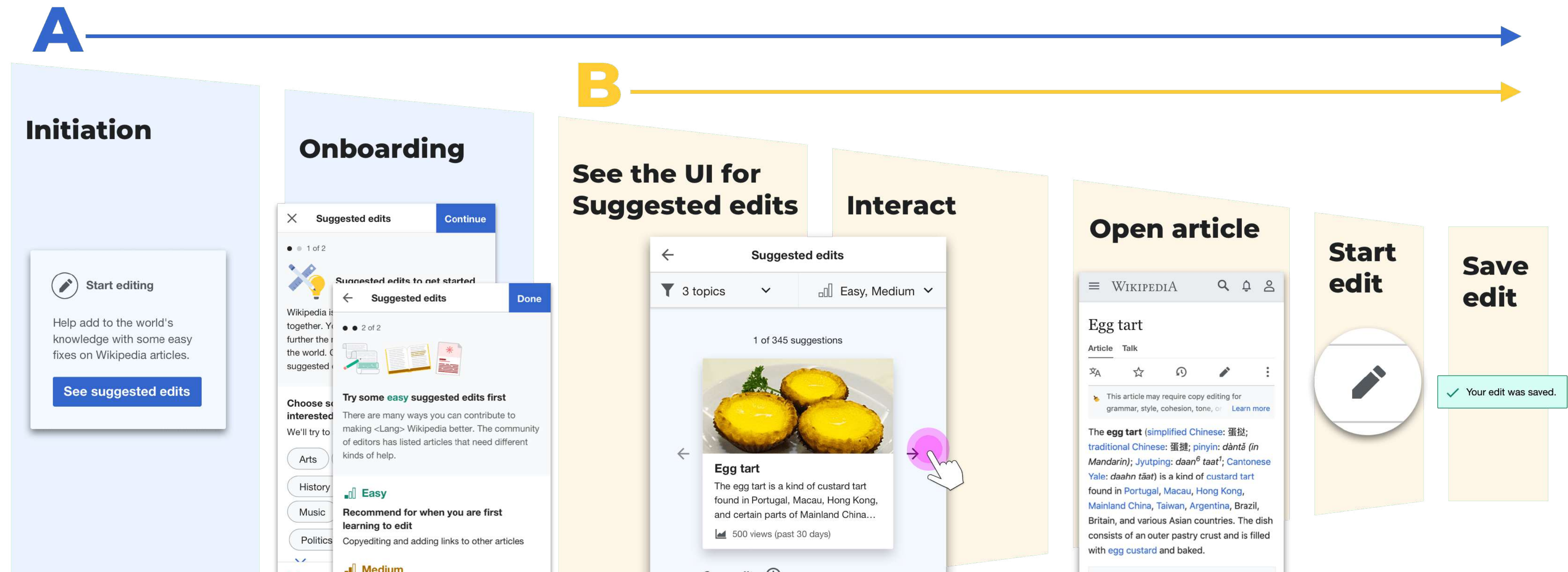

Interpreting key results

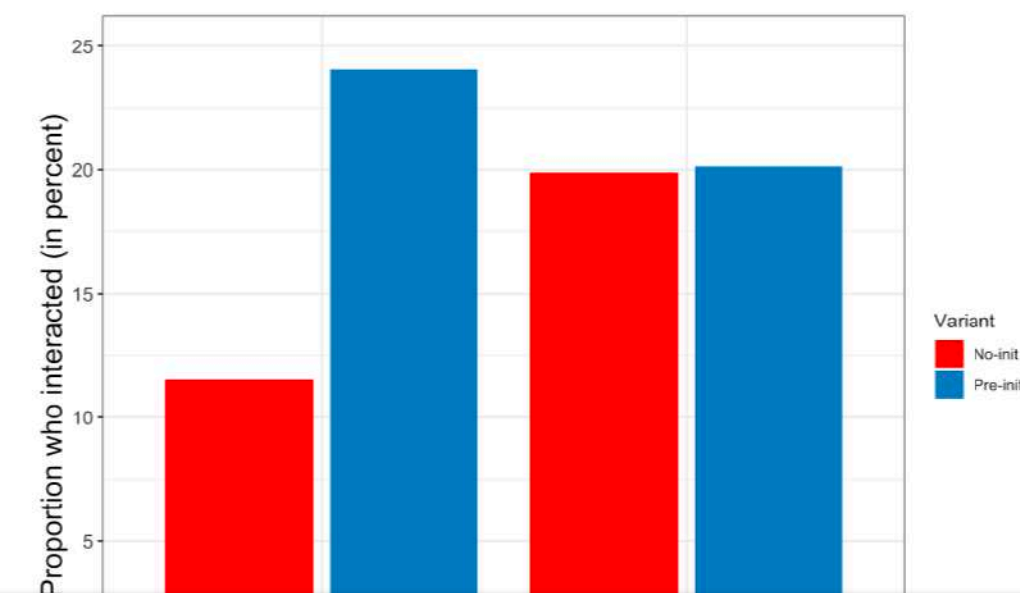
1. Variant B with No onboarding had people interacting with editing tasks.

2. Variant A overall still had more completed edits.

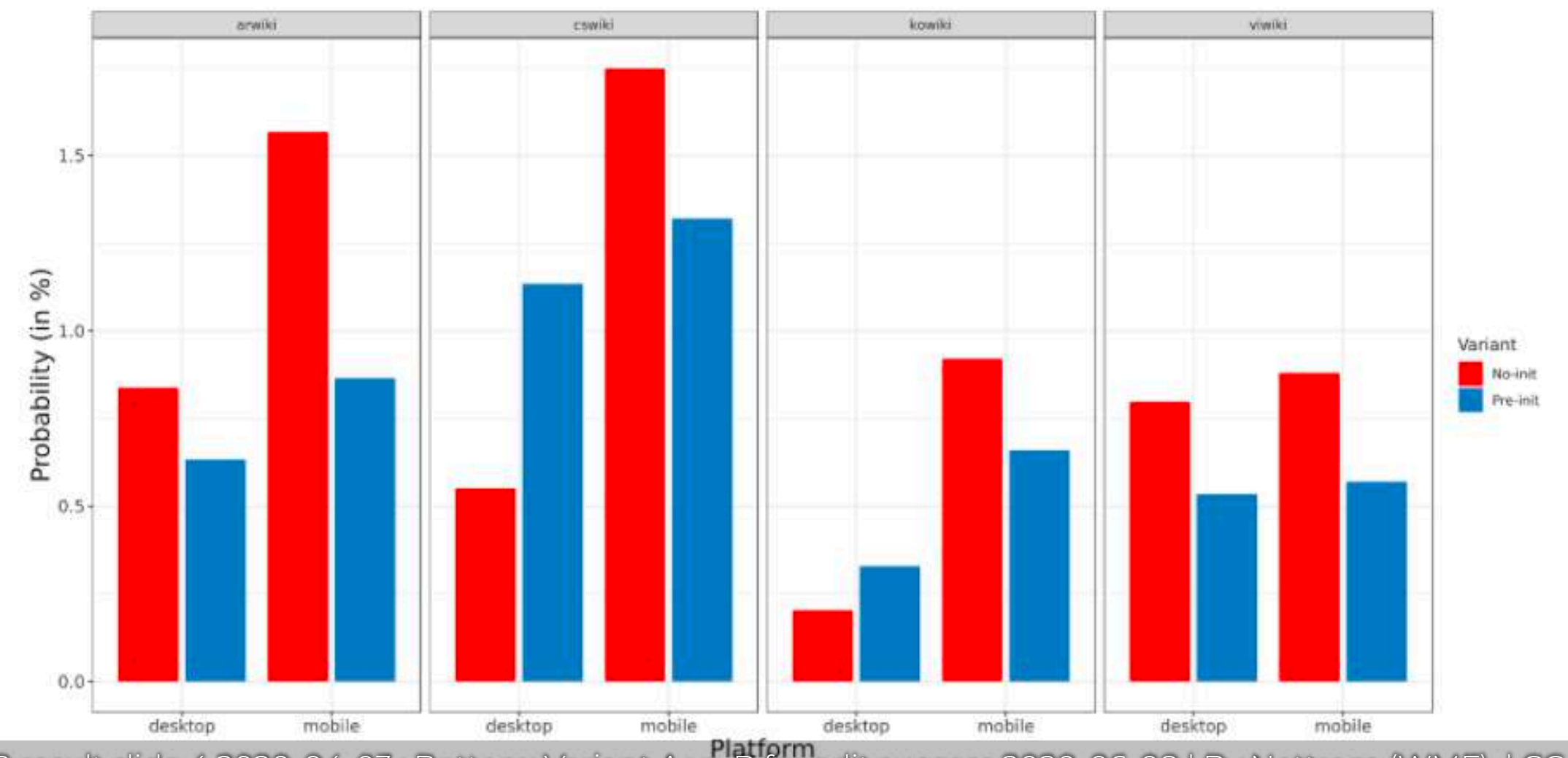
Working with a data analyst and PM, we interpreted what was significant, and the implications the data had on making design improvements.

Rate of Interaction

- Significant *increase* on desktop:
 - 11.5% to 24.1%
- *Not significant* on mobile:
 - 19.9% to 20.1%

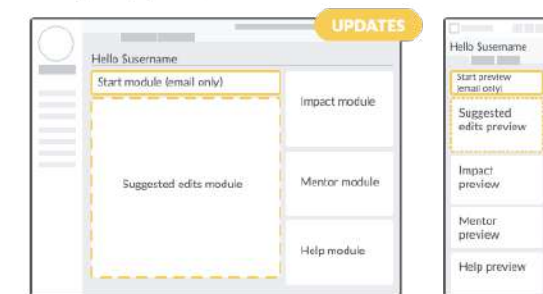

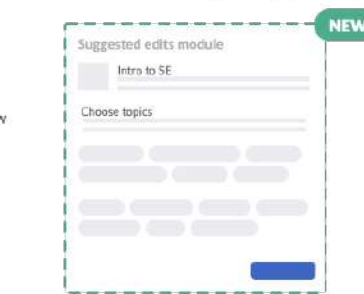

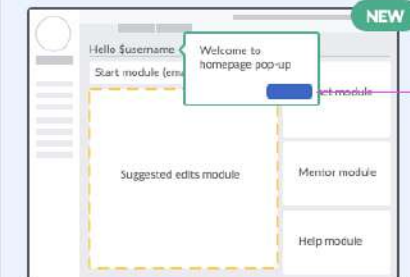

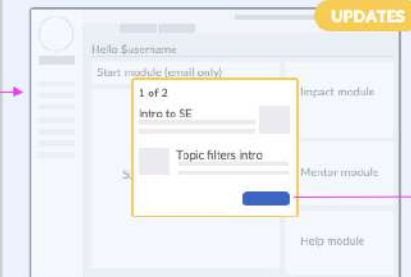

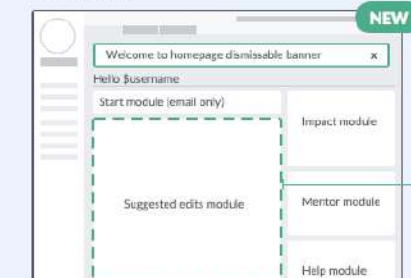

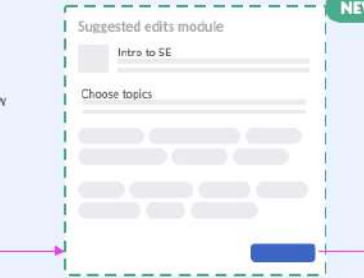

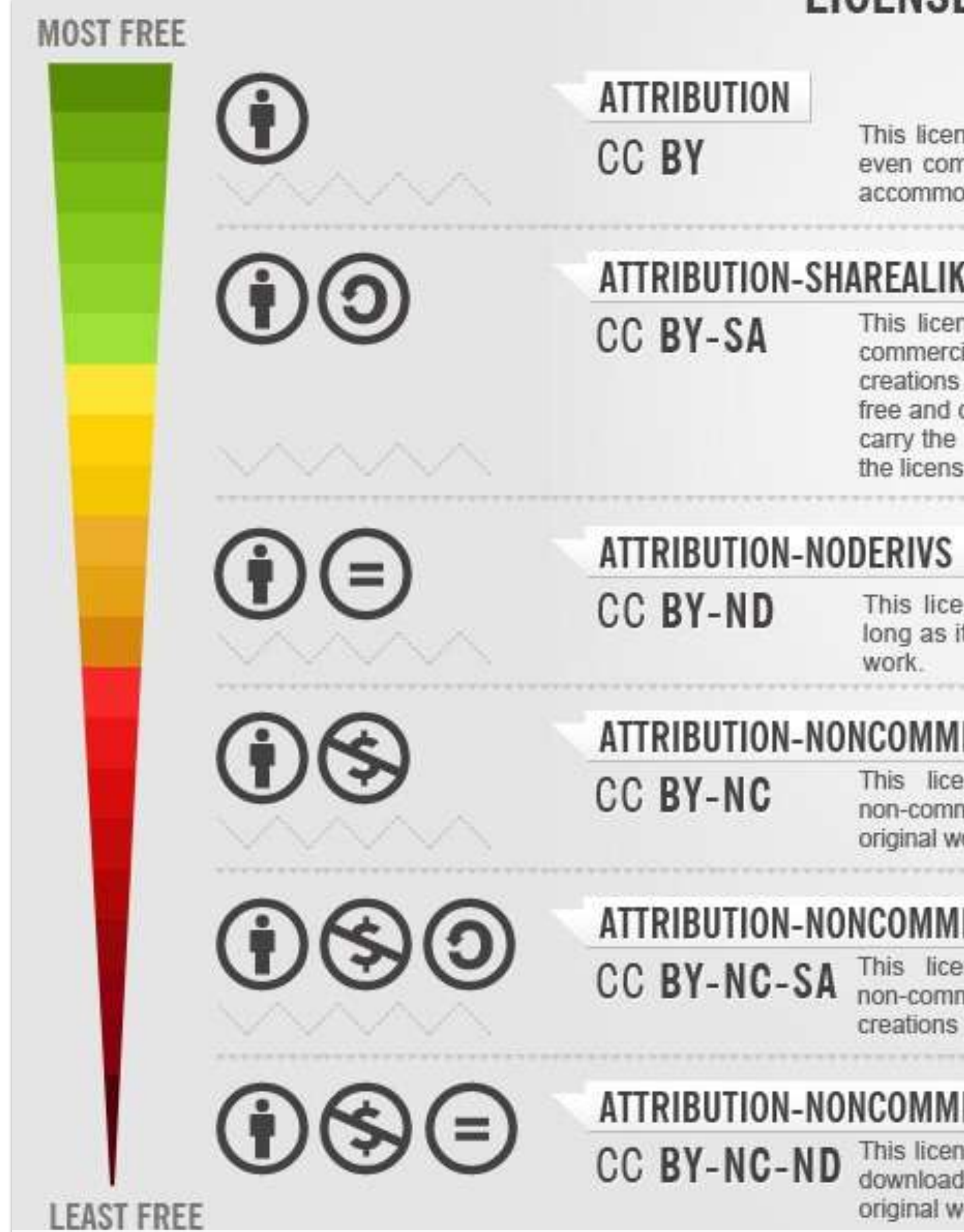
